ABS

- Annual **<u>survey</u>** of employer firms
- Content: Provides counts, receipts & economic information for employer businesses by sex, ethnicity, race, & veteran status of business owners at:
 - Geography levels
 - US, state, metropolitan statistical area (MSA) (all years)
 - County, economic place (select years)
 - $\circ~$ NAICS levels
 - 2-3 digit NAICS (all years)
 - 2-6 digit NAICS (select years)
 - $\circ~$ Employment and receipt-size class of firm
 - Cross-tabulations

NES-D

- <u>Not a survey</u> -- Annual series created only w/ administrative records (AR) & Census data
- Content: Provides counts & receipts for <u>universe*</u> of nonemployer businesses by sex, ethnicity, race, & veteran status of business owners at:
 - Geography levels (currently)
 - US, state, metropolitan statistical area (MSA)
 - NAICS levels (currently)
 - 2-3 digit NAICS
 - Receipt-size class
 - $\circ~$ Legal form of organization (LFO)
 - Cross-tabulations

ABS

- Content (cont'd): Measures various other topics w/ rotating content modules:
 - $\circ~\mbox{Research}$ and Development
 - \circ Innovation
 - \circ Technology
 - \circ Financing
- First release was in 12/2019 with 2017 reference year (2018 ABS)

NES-D

- **Content (cont'd):** Provides other data for nonemployers:
 - \circ Age of Owner
 - $\circ~$ Place of Birth
 - $\circ\,$ U.S. Citizenship
 - Plans to add non-demographic characteristics (e.g., Does nonemployer also work for a wage, does he/she hire contractors, marital status)

Who are Nonemployers?

- Nonemployers: businesses w/ no paid employment, subject to federal income taxes, & w/ annual receipts of \$1,000 or more
- •As of 2018, there were approximately 26 million nonemployers accounting for about 83 percent of all U.S. businesses but only about 3 percent of receipts
 - Approximately 87 percent of nonemployers are sole proprietors (i.e., businesses with only 1 owner, usually thought-of as self-employed persons)
- Nonemployer growth outpacing that of employers
 - From 2014 to 2018, number of nonemployers grew by approximately 11 percent and employer firms by approximately 3.5 percent
- Unprecedented increase in business applications during pandemic (see graph) – will they become nonemployer businesses?

How is NES-D created?

- Nonemployer universe identified & extracted from Business Register*
- Unique anonymized person identifiers called Protected Identification Keys (PIKs) facilitate linkage of records across data sources
- <u>Source of PIKs</u>/Owner identification
 - Sole proprietors Tax form 1040
 - Partnerships & S-corporations Schedule K-1 (Forms 1065 & 1022S)
 - Owners of U.S. nonemployer C-corporations cannot be identified with tax or AR data (only 2% of nonemployers & 4% of receipts)
 - Evaluating feasibility of imputation
- <u>Data sources</u>: BR, Decennial, American Community Survey, SSA Numident, DVA AR data



*The BR is a comprehensive database of all U.S. employer and nonemployer business establishments containing business name, identifier, address, industry classification, legal form of organization, receipts, and employment and payroll (these last two apply only to employer firms).

How well does NES-D cover nonemployer universe?

- PIK information available for approximately 99 percent of nonemployer firms in each year not including C-corps
- Availability of sex, age, place of birth & citizenship for approximately 98-99 percent of owners (w/ PIKs)
- Availability of race and ethnicity data for approximately 90-95 percent of owners (w/ PIKs)
- Approximately 90-95 percent of owners (w/ PIKs) are not missing any demographics
 - Only about 1 percent are missing 3 or more demographics
- Missing demographics are imputed

 \Rightarrow In context: Nonemployers non-response rate in SBO approx. 50%



NES-D - Some challenges

- Owners of U.S. nonemployer C-corporations cannot be identified with tax or AR data (only 2% of nonemployers)
 - Evaluating feasibility of imputation
- Veteran status
 - Conceptual differences between what the ABS view as a veteran and VA's definition: VA concept is narrower
 - Potential for supplementary AR source of military service data
- Equally-owned category for sole proprietorships (1 owner) possible in survey but not in AR sources
- Shocks (e.g., pandemic) may delay/impact AR (e.g., tax filings)



NES-D Next Steps

- Increase level of detail for nonemployers:
 - Geo detail: Potentially down to county level in future releases as disclosure-avoidance rules allow
 - Industry detail: Potentially down to 6-digit NAICS in future releases as disclosure-avoidance rules allow
- Shorten dissemination lag from 3 to 2 years –but pandemic getting in the way
- Additional characteristics for nonemployers, including:
 - Household (e.g., marital status)
 - Related to gig-economy (e.g., does nonemployer also work for a wage? Does nonemployer use contractors?)
 - Firm age
 - Transitions to employer status
 - Patenting activity, exporter/importer status

Robotics usage 45% lower for femaleowned businesses

Variables	Data Sources
Receipts, industry, geographic location, legal form of organization	Nonemployers database from Business Register
Race Hispanic origin Sex Age of owner Place of birth U.S. Citizenship status	Decennial Census Data, American Community Survey (ACS), & Numident (from Social Security Administration)
Veteran-status	Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) AR data (USVETS). Also exploring Department of Defense data.



How is NES-D created? (2/2)

- To obtain firm-level demographics:
 - Methodology consistent with employer side (ABS)
 - Exclude firms where top owner owns < 10% of firm => demographically unclassifiable firms
 - Top 4 (person) owners (>95% of NE firms have 4 or fewer owners)
 - Firm is assigned to the demographic group holding majority ownership (>50%)
 - Equally-owned category possible when demographic characteristic is binary (e.g., female, male, female-male equally owned)

Nonemployer Universe



Businesses w/ no paid employment, subject to federal income taxes, & w/ annual receipts of \$1,000 or more (\$1 or more for Construction sector)

Sole Proprietorships (1 owner): 22,933,726 (87%) (63% of receipts) Partnerships (>1 owner): 1,950,997 (7%) (22% of receipts) S-corporations (>=1 owner): 1,199,052 (5%) (11% of receipts) C-corporations (>= 1 owner) 401,757 (2%) (4% of receipts)
