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Criminal Justice Administrative Records System (CJARS)

- Data infrastructure project to develop a platform for the next generation of statistics and research on criminal justice system and the justice-involved population
- Partnership between Census Bureau and University of Michigan started in 2016



Current criminal justice data infrastructure is incomplete

- Limits how performance is measured, which policy questions are asked
- Leads to varying definitions of recidivism
- Makes it difficult to identify effective policy levers
- Prevents comprehensive benefit-cost analyses



Goal: develop a more complete criminal justice data infrastructure and enable its use

- Collect, harmonize, and link longitudinal, multi-jurisdictional criminal justice data to track individuals and cases across space and time
- Enable timely and innovative federal statistical products about criminal justice system and justice-involved population
- Provide national research platform for qualified researchers on approved projects



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CJARS stakeholders and roles

- University of Michigan acquires and harmonizes data from criminal justice agencies, including law enforcement, judicial, and corrections agencies
- Census Bureau links CJARS with other socioeconomic data to build data products for data providers, develop new data products, and improve operations
- Qualified researchers on approved projects analyze CJARS in the FSRDCs
- Communities and policymakers use CJARS-derived statistical products to understand the performance of the criminal justice system



CJARS data coverage

All records (back to 1970s)

- > 300 data providers
- 3.5b records
- 216m CJ events
- ► 40m unique individuals Statewide records
 - States with coverage of state court, state corrections, and/or state repository represent >80% of U.S. population

States where CJARS covers statewide data for at least 10 years

Growing CJARS ecosystem of researchers

Platform enables a community of researchers

- Rapid growth in research proposals and use by FSRDC researchers
- CJARS team has prototyped research applications
 - Children living with justice-involved adults
 - Self-employment as an alternative to employer-based jobs
 - Impacts of financial sanctions
 - Safety net enrollment and justice involvement
- Research is a critical tool for improving data quality



Growing CJARS ecosystem of partners

- Research will assess whether CJARS data can be used as an alternative data source for enumeration/imputation/testing of Group Quarters in 2030 Census
- Partnership with Council of State Governments will support development of agency performance dashboards
- Design panel for next National Longitudinal Survey of Youth cohort recommended that BLS consider use of administrative data, including CJARS



Session highlights growing CJARS ecosystem

- Justice Outcomes Explorer statistical product will report on reentry experiences of justice-involved people
 - Offer new insights about this population using population-level linkage
 - Provide value back to agency data providers and create an incentive for agencies to join
- Reimbursable work with CDC measures incidence and impacts of adverse childhood experiences
 - New population measures previously only available in retrospective surveys
 - Demonstrates the value that CJARS brings to the Census Bureau Data Linkage Infrastructure, which in turn adds value to CJARS

After Census processes roster through Person Identification Validation System (PVS), CJARS can be linked anonymously by Protected Identification Key (PIK)





After disclosure review, agencies receive aggregate statistical products based on linked data
